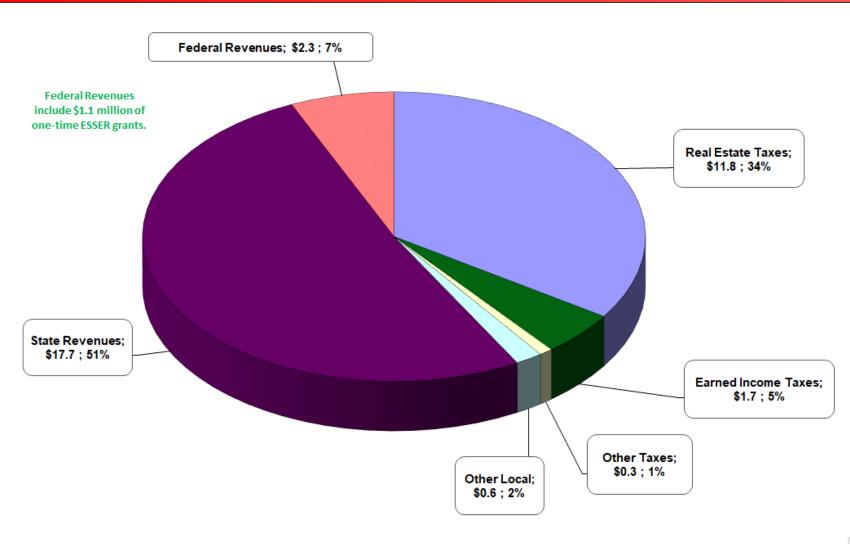

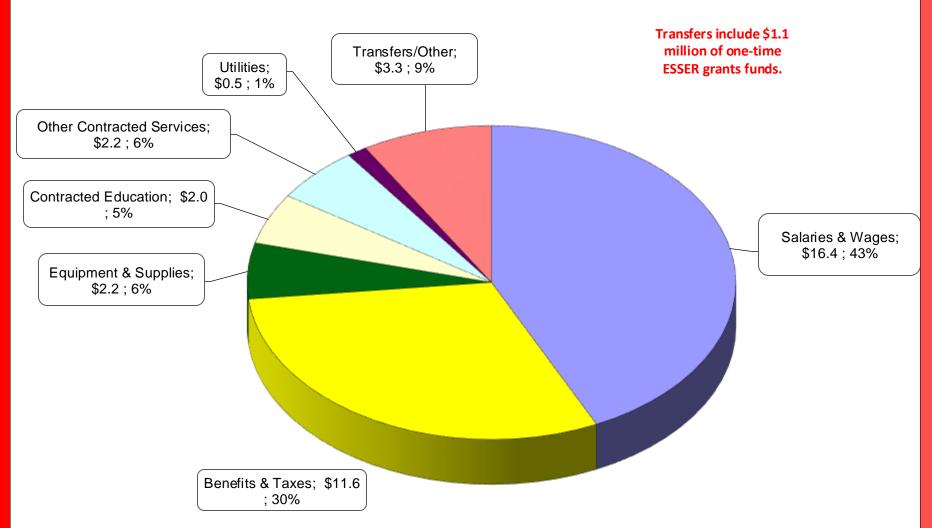

## How did we get here? What has GM Done to Control Spending?

- Eliminated 16.5 teaching positions since 2003
- Teachers agreed to higher health care contributions
- Cut a secretarial, groundskeeper and building & grounds supervisor positions
- Consolidated bus runs
- Voluntary pay freezes by administrators (1 year) and bus drivers (3 years) during 2011-2012
- Brought certain special education costs in-house from I.U.5

## How did we get here? What has GM Done to Control Spending? (cont)

- Switched health care plan administrators
- Negotiated better lease terms on copiers
- Eliminated three administrative positions by attrition
- Limited hours for part-time non-instructional employees to avoid ACA health care offers
- Upgraded indoor & outdoor lighting and HVAC systems for energy savings. Secured rebates.

- Contributions to State Pension from 2010-11 through 2019-20:
  - Payments \$32.4 M
  - Subsidies (18.7 M)
  - District Share \$13.7 M

Special Education Expenditures from 2010-11 through 2019-20:

Payments \$35.3 M
Subsidies (19.6 M)

District Share \$15.7 M

Tuition Paid to Cyber/Charter Schools from 2010-11 through 2019-20:

- Payments \$6.9 M
- Subsidies (0.1 M)

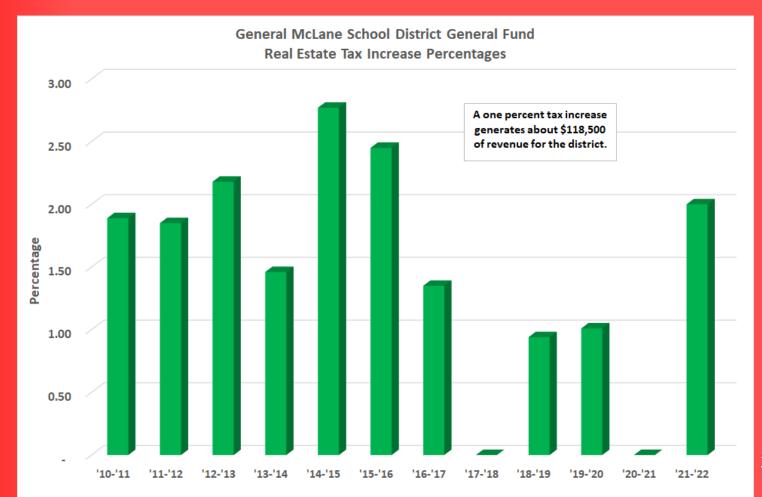
